

Overview: to graduate high school, all students in the York Catholic District School Board must mandatorily complete a total of 40 community service hours between July 1st of their Grade 8 summer, until the end of their final year in grade 12. These hours can only be completed outside of school hours, including during lunch breaks, after school, on weekends, and during holidays or school breaks (i.e. Christmas break, March break, summer break). In addition, these hours must be unpaid and solely have to be volunteer based. As hours are collected, students are expected to fill out a sheet recording each volunteer hour, the activity they performed, and the signature of the overviewer and the number of hours they collected. Application Deadline: January 15, 2024. Target date for Ontario universities to receive all application data and grades for applications submitted.

Semester One Marks Submission: February 22, 2024. Target date for Ontario universities to receive all final grades available for 4U/M courses and current full-year grades for 4U/M courses.

Semester Two Midterm Submission: May 2, 2024. Target date for Ontario universities to receive all midterm or final grades available for 4U/M courses and interim grades for full-year courses.

Expect Acceptance: May 29, 2024. The latest date all current Ontario high school students who submitted their application by the January application deadline can expect a response from an Ontario university.

Other Admission Expectations: June 3, 2024. The earliest date a current Ontario high school student may be required to respond to an Ontario university offer of admission and give a financial commitment.


Semi-formal: Nov 10, 2023

In comparison, 42% of people will be attending. Students have explained why they are deciding not to attend, saying that the price was excessive and unaffordable.



WHAT IS THE SCHOOL LISTENING TO?



THE 2023 TORONTO BLUE JAYS: A BASEBALL TRAGEDY

After the disastrous season that the Blue Jays had, the question remains: Who is to blame? John Schneider? Ross Atkins? Guillermo Martinez? Despite having the 7th largest payroll in the MLB, the Blue Jays organization does not have a sufficient amount of stamina to keep their managers, coaches, or players going.

Throughout the season there was a serious struggle with hitting, especially when runners are in scoring position. George Springer went 0-for-35 hits in July despite being in the leadoff position. His leadoff spot was then replaced by Whit Merrifield until Merrifield started to slump and Springer began to pick up his pace. When their top players are underperforming it's not a shock that they didn't make it farther in the playoffs.

On a more positive note, the Jays 2023 bullpen has had a significant improvement compared to 2022. Yusei Kikuchi had a 5.19 earned run average (ERA) in 2022 which changed into a 3.86 ERA in 2023, winning 11 of the 17 games he started. Thanks to the acquisition of Jordan Hicks and Genesis Cabrera during trade season, (one of the top decisions that management has made this year in my opinion) it made the bullpen even stronger. Hicks has a 3.29 ERA and a four-seam fastball averaging 100.4 mph this season; one of the best in the league.



Together, with Kevin Gausman - one of the best starters in the American League - the bullpen was classified among the finest in the MLB. One primary issue within the bullpen was Alek Manoah's performance throughout the season (I'll save the Anthony Bass stuff for another time). The Blue Jays won only 3 of the 12 games where he started, but he allowed the opposing team to score runs. Although he had a strong 2.24 ERA in 2022, his ERA increased to 5.87 in 2023. He was demoted to the Florida Complex League in late June where he allowed 11 runs in one game. Not long after, pitching staff and management deemed he was ready to return, which he did in July. Since then, he was demoted to AAA Buffalo Bisons where he failed to report in. According to the Sportsnet podcast: Blair and Barker, he didn't report in as he "... was upset at the Toronto Blue Jays' decision to sideline him in favor of the team's other starting pitchers."

Although there were many lows throughout the season, it wasn't all bad. In July, Vladimir Gurerrero Jr. won the Home Run Derby during the MLB All-Star Game in Seattle. The Blue Jays swept a series 9 times during the 2023 regular season and in the current postseason, they have 5 players who are Gold Glove finalists. In June, Bo Bichette led the American League in total bases, multi-hit games, and batting percentage. Whit Merrifield was named to MLB's Team of the Month for July in the position of 2nd base.

In August, Davis Schneider - who was a part of AAA Buffalo - was called up during the Blue Jays' series against the Red Sox at Fenway. He did the best possible thing a rookie could do at his first MLB at-bat, score a home run. Davis Schneider quickly became a fan favourite, along with two other AAA call-ups, Ernie Clement and Spencer Horwitz. Quickly from there they got the nickname "The Buffalo Brigade". They scored a total of 9 runs and had a total of 10 RBI in 4 games. This was before Schneider began his slump in September, batting an average of .276, and both Horwitz and Clement were demoted to the minor leagues. All I know is fans cannot wait to see them back together and hopefully on the 40-man roster, next season.

Many people might say April 2023 was the month of Matt Chapman. He was named the American League Player of the Week after hitting 2 home runs, allowing 12 runners to be batted in (RBI), and had a .464 avg as well as a 1.373 on-base plus slugging percentage (OPS). He was named to MLB's Team of the Month for March/April 2023. Not only was he Player of the Week and a part of Team of the Month, but was also named the American League Player of the Month. By the end of April, he had hit 5 home runs, had 21 RBI, had a 1.152 OPS, and a 2.0 fangraphs wins above replacement (FWAR). It goes without saying that Chapman had a brilliant April, and all the team could hope for is that he continued to play like this the whole season.

As we learned by being Blue Jays fans, not all good things last. After April, Chapman's batting average turned into a .240 for the 2023 season and then .167 within the last 15 games. With a total of 509 at-bats and 165 strikeouts, Chapman is no longer regarded as one of the star players on the team, but as a player where fans already know it's over when he is up at-bat





With seven free agents this upcoming break, it is crucial that the team takes a look at what they need to improve on. During the 2023 wildcard series against the Minnesota Twins, the Jays' management made some very questionable and impactful decisions. The decision that possibly cost the Jays the World Series was pulling out starting pitcher José Berríos in the 4th inning, during the second Wild Card game, to replace him with Yusei Kikuchi.

If there were players that could hit properly with the current bullpen, the Jay's would have been able to advance in the playoffs.

The players are not only to blame for the disastrous 2023 season, but also coaching and management. Many fans wanted Manager John Schneider to resign or be fired due to the many important losses that occurred during the season (when the Jay's were swept by Texas in september is a primary example). To fans' dismay, he announced - in a press conference after the Wild Card loss - that neither of those options would be happening and that he will be staying as manager in 2024. Ross Atkins, the Jays' General Manager, announced that he will also be returning in 2024. During Atkins' press conference, he threw John Schneider under the bus for pulling Berríos from the 4th inning. He stated, "When that decision occurred, I found out about it when you did." Atkins' was very quick to dismiss the fact that he had anything to do with the decisions made during that game in an attempt to remove the target off his back.

Mark Sharpio, President and CEO of the Toronto Blue Jays, stated "Ross needs to get better, but he's done a good job." Many people would find this statement false, as this so-called "good job" does not include the way the organization handled the Manoah situation. Another example is when the organization had Jay Jackson optioned to AAA a total of 5 times this season, then had to designate him for assignment. Additionally, during the trade season, Ross Atkins took in Paul DeJong for the Blue Jays. DeJong went 3-for-44 and had a .068 batting average. Just after 18 days of being on the team, he was designated for assignment. Rogers Media still owes him approximately \$2 Million, money that could have been better used on the payroll.

Being a Jays fan in 2023 could not have been more stressful. They are the prime example of what people would call a "baseball disaster-class". Until something is changed in management - and the players become stronger hitters - it looks like we will be seeing a lot more seasons that look just like this one. As the Jays' social media admin would say: thank you fans and see you next season.

THE DISAPPOINTING SEASON OF CHECO PEREZ

Despite starting the 2023 Formula 1 season on a very good note, Sergio Perez aka Checo Perez has been showing clear signs of struggle in recent months. Ever since landing 16th place in Monaco, he has been struggling to keep up with his teammate Max Verstappen. Perez is clearly facing pressure as Verstappen already won the championship in Qatar whilst Perez got 3 penalties. He has been constantly delivering mediocre results in contrast to Verstappen, who has been busy setting world records. Considering they are both using the same car, it has people wondering why Verstappen can achieve such amazing results but Perez cannot.

Although he has won 2 of the first 4 races of the season, Perez has not been showing consistent results in the past few races. Perez landed 8th place in Singapore, He did not finish (DNF) in Japan, in Qatar he got 10th place, and in Mexico, he crashed into Charles Leclerc. Perez has also received multiple penalties in recent races, including 5-second penalties in Japan and Singapore. He also received three separate 5-second penalties in Qatar.

Perez was only 6 points behind Verstappen after the first four races of the season. He then fell behind by enough points, that it allowed Verstappen to take home the Drivers Championship early on in Qatar. There is also Lewis Hamilton, who has also been quickly working on closing the gap between him in third place and Perez who stands in second. Red Bull senior advisor Dr. Helmut Marko explained "Qualifying is the weakness of Perez. We have to defend second place because Hamilton - unfortunately - is getting closer and closer,...". If Perez continues to perform the way he is - there's no doubt that Hamilton will take second place by the end of the season.

Perez has been dangerously underperforming considering his contract is up in 2024. Red Bull reserve driver Daniel Ricciardo is posing a clear threat to Perez's seat - as he was promoted to Red Bull's sister team - Alpha Tauri as a driver when Nyck de Vries was fired. Red Bull team principal Christian Horner is claiming that his 2024 seat is safe - but after 2024 Perez's seat is not definite. There are also plenty of other drivers whose contracts are up in 2024 including Carlos Sainz, Charles Leclerc, Yuki Tsunoda, and Esteban Ocon - drivers who are much more deserving of the 2nd Red Bull seat.

Red Bull team principal Christian Horner told the media "We really want to see him achieve what we know (Checo) is capable of [...]". Even though Perez has stated that he is "100% sure" about keeping his seat, most people are not convinced after his disastrous 2023 season. At the end of the day, rumours are rumours, and fans will just have to wait until 2024 to see if Perez has secured a seat for upcoming seasons.



IMPACT OF THE ERAS TOUR MOVIE (AND SWIFTIES)

Talk all you want about Taylor Swift, but no matter how much you like her, you can't deny the impact that her most recent concert film has had on global economies and societies. With the exclusive Eras Tour that has been slowly making its way around the world, Swifties scrambled to get these coveted tickets. Exhibit B: the insane profit garnered by Taylor and her team. With production costs coming out to \$15 million, the profit margin is quite substantial. As suspected, the Eras Tour garnered so much attention and fame, in part due to the post-pandemic mentality. With the COVID-19 pandemic just recently dwindling, Swifties and non-Swifties alike flocked to Ticketmaster with the opportunity of a spectacular concert.

"This was an amazing experience! I didn't know I was into something like this, but when I watched it, I felt so much joy!" - T.H.



The popcorn bucket and drink cup gained lots of popularity, with most theatres selling out of them in days, if not by the end of opening night. At Cineplex, both items cost a total of \$27.10 with tax, making it quite a splurge for some cheap plastic and improper colouring. Exhibit C: the insane reselling prices of these buckets and cups. On reselling sites like eBay, you can easily find a bucket selling for \$50 each and even as high as \$100. The chokehold that Taylor and her exclusive merch have on people is clearly evident with the reselling prices of not just her concert tickets, but even cinema popcorn buckets.






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

REAL TIPS FROM REAL TEACHERS

English can be very subjective material; the art of writing might seem like something unattainable or maybe even not that useful. I'm sure you've heard from your English teachers every year about the importance of English in your everyday life and future career paths, no matter what road you may be taking. No matter how many times you hear the speech, it's easy to dismiss its substance and fall back into a mindset of "English is too subjective", "I already know how to speak English, why do I need an English class?", "I'm just not a very strong writer" or even "I just never know what my English teacher wants me to write; why is the stuff we're reading even important?"

Well, gone are the days of disconnect between students and teachers here at SBA. I've compiled a series of interviews from your very own English teachers to let you in on the secrets to better writing and communication skills.



What are the fundamental components of a well structured essay? What gives an essay better flow?

Mrs. Dunlop - "There are basically three distinct aspects to good essay writing: structure, content, and style. In terms of structure, a great essay needs to provide a clear framework so that the reader can follow the content. Structure-wise, that means an interesting introductory paragraph that includes a thesis; without a thesis that indicates the key concepts that the writer will explore in the essay, it's likely that the whole essay will be kind of a mess. There should be a series of paragraphs that are logically ordered to address the thesis concepts and, of course, a concluding paragraph to wrap it all up."

Ms. Sloane - "Start with a specific, opinionated thesis. Keep in mind that there should be people who disagree with what you're trying to argue in order for the thesis to be compelling. Once you've gotten started, the intro paragraph should provide the necessary context; a title, the author and a specific theme to be elaborated on," she said. "I like when the students go over their argument, briefly," she mentioned, but cautioned against repetitive vocabulary. "Touch lightly on each argument so that your intro doesn't render your essay redundant. Throughout body paragraphs, use transition sentences to address either a point made or a contextual piece of evidence mentioned in the previous paragraph before moving to the next topic in order for the essay to flow smoothly and address how your argument will back your original thesis within the first few sentences." In terms of structure, Ms. Sloane says that "when you leave high school and sort of just enter the real world, the five paragraph structure is hardly found anywhere [...] you have to learn [the structure] before you can break the rules." To keep a consistent flow throughout the essay, avoid contractions, slang and general language (ie. "thing", "stuff", "happy", "bad"). Instead, use more specific language. See Ms. Sloan's emotion's wheel to find appropriate synonyms to fit the tone you are trying to give. Before handing in your essay, read through it a few times and let it sit with you. "You can't really get a sense of [the flow] if you don't read it in one go."

What are the foundational skills of essay writing -past grammar and punctuation- that make a compelling and interesting essay?

Mrs. Dunlop - "Writing that's compelling and interesting typically has insightful content but it always has amazing style. The best way for someone to improve their writing style is to read. A lot. Not only will reading [...] increase a person's vocabulary, it will also familiarize them with more interesting and varied sentence structures that they can mimic in their own writing."

Mr. Samuel - Writers, at the highest level, need to be intentional with and aware of their structure. "When a writer shows an awareness of what her argument requires to be strong, or a writer shows an awareness of what weakens her argument, and then just I think the term is metacognitive skill which is radical reflexivity where a writer is aware of everything she's [written] so that [...] the tone of the consciousness, being sentence by sentence, at any point in time, the writer can refer to past claims, past propositions, because it allows the reader to feel completely encompassed by the rhetorical presence of the writer."



What tools or strategies do you believe students should use more often to enhance analysis/reading comprehension skills?

Mr. Huh - Before you are able to write, you have to be able to read. Read for at least 30 minutes a day; pick up a non fiction, opinion article about the happenings of the day. Read more often; read everything. "By the time you graduate, you will be a really great writer," he says.

Mr. Samuel - "Definitely it's the use of changing [narration] into noun concepts." Instead, for example, of saying "this character was angry at this other character", change the statement to say "this character's anger". This structural change from the narrative event to a noun allows us to properly analyze. "Narration doesn't ask for analysis," he says, "The tone of your writing when you are retelling [...] is just a bad shadow of the original." Rather than just retelling the story, analysis of a noun concept allows for the reader and the writer to think together about the implications of the behaviors and emotions and interactions between characters in a critical way.



What would motivate people to be more engaged with their English classes?

Mrs. D'amelio - For all the STEM career hopefuls out there: "A lot of STEM related companies are hiring humanities grads [...] because science kids can solve a problem, sure but [...] they say that they're lacking that innovative thinking." Creative thinking might just be a skill worth brushing up on in order to stand out in the crowd.

Mrs. Dunlop - Presentations will come up in any line of work—if you're a doctor, you have to present news to your patient, if you're going into business, you have to present to your clients—and what makes or breaks your presentational skills is your vocabulary. If you plan on using visual aids, Mrs. Dunlop has a word of warning: "If you're just going to say what's on your slide, you're kind of late to the party" (because your audience has already read it). Paraphrasing the material makes the information you're sharing seem different enough so that the presentation is more intriguing. To consider the practical side of things, "On the most basic level, it doesn't matter what you intend to do with your life, you have to use your grade 12 English credit." She adds: "It's the only mandatory mark." So, if nothing else, there's a mandatory reason to stay motivated! "You cannot just be emotionally [and] mentally absent [from your English classes] in grades 9, 10, 11 and think you're going to turn on the jets in grade 12 [and start] getting nineties." At that point, Grade 12 English might be the most important course you take, no matter what pathway you plan on taking; "if your [other marks] are amazing and your English isn't even a 70, you're probably not going to get [in]."

Ms. Sloane - Communication is the basis of everything we do in life. Ms. Sloane emphasizes that within friendships, or romantic relationships, or in a job interview, "being able to properly express yourself is really important." Communicating clearly can make or break these scenarios and can shape the quality of your life. Simple tools like expanding your vocabulary to really encapsulate what you say, otherwise you limit yourself to a smaller spectrum of words that won't always cut it.

In terms of analysis, it doesn't just teach you how to analyze text, it trains your brain to develop skill sets we develop in everyday life. "A coach might tell people to lift weights even if the sport doesn't involve throwing dumbbells", she metaphorizes that English works the same way; you have to exercise and build up strength in that skill. "We analyze people on a daily basis," she says. Learning to analyze the character of what authors show us about a character can expand our social awareness skills in the real world. Literature, she says, also teaches the critical social skill of compassion. Reading, more so than movies or tv shows, allows you to really put yourself in other people's shoes and feel and understand what they're feeling. All in all, literature makes you a well rounded individual and having a little something to say about everything makes you a more interesting conversationalist.



Above and beyond good grammar and punctuation, what should students be getting out of their English classes?

Mr. Samuel - "Easy; if English was only about information, we would write in point form. It's not data management. English is about the relationships between [...] data or knowledge. That's typically called wisdom." The information we learn in English class doesn't just relate to a specific text, it relates to the general idea of human concepts and values. There is no way to relate to those things without prose. French philosopher Michel de Montaigne who originated the genre of the essay by wanting to "write a literary self portrait of himself". It was invented as a method of self assessment, thus giving purpose to the modern literary essay as an assessment of text. The mindset you go into English class with is the experience you will take from it; total ignorance versus an approach to wisdom. Those who have the latter in mind seek to learn what we do, as a society, with everything that we know. "English takes you to the qualitative aspects of life which cannot be quantified in a spreadsheet."

What is something that you know now about essay writing that you wish you knew in high school?

Mrs. D'amelio - Some people are just natural writers while others aren't. "I had to grow into my writing," she told me, "I didn't think I was a good writer [in high school] and looking back I wasn't a good writer". She encourages students to take the time to figure out what their "voice" is, even if it takes them until college or university to do it.

Mrs. Dunlop - "If there [were] something I wish I'd leaned into a bit more with my own writing in high school, it would be prewriting and drafting. It's easy to dismiss the whole "first draft, peer editing, final copy" thing as being annoying or just taking too much time but understanding that writing really is a process -- and investing in that process-- always results in a much better essay." To let students in on some insider information, if you find yourself wondering why learn the five paragraph essay if you rarely find it outside of a high school setting; "[Teachers have to] teach a template because there's such a broad spectrum of skill levels for the students we teach." So, while the template is broad, it also gives you more leeway because you're not necessarily locked into it for life. Write as many paragraphs that suit your purpose as long as you can get your point across clearly and concisely.

Mr. Samuel - "That writing is reading. At least in English, essay writing is 95 percent the quality of one's reading. Students typically think they can get an idea, read a few sentences from a book [...] but that's just an attempt to [...] not get a zero." The former practice, he says, makes essay writing the easiest thing because all the information is at your fingertips. "Writing essays is not for tourists; it's for serious people and serious people are willing to read."

Ms. Sloane - "I think in high school , I was attached to the very specific instructions that the teacher would give." Oftentimes, the "big picture" of the 5 paragraph structure can overshadow the skills that essay writing is supposed to teach. "[...] I remember [at UofT] I got a 60 on an essay and I remember I started crying." The critique she said she received from her TA was that the essay was "too robotic". It is vital to have a clear idea of what you're really trying to say in your essay and make sure your statements are cohesive. To her students, she recommends that you don't get lost in the rules but to focus on keeping your ideas clear.



What do you find is lacking from most of the essays you read from your students?

Mrs D'amelio - It may seem redundant, but having a firm grasp on the basics of sentence structure is vital. "You have good ideas," she implores all students to know, "but we're losing our natural ability to form grammatically correct sentences" which may just be where we're losing marks. Mrs. D'amelio also advises that students go into their essays knowing what they want to talk about, "even before you start the writing process." She also advises students to rely on their own resources; ChatGPT just won't cut it! "Your own thoughts are enough."

Mrs. Dunlop - "Sometimes students forget to fully develop the content in their essays. It's really important to provide depth of analysis, especially after including a quote, for example." Context without critical analysis is just a summary; an essay should provide further insight into the text. "Remember to keep the goal in mind, which means being [sure] to prove the thesis. If there's not enough critical thinking evident in an essay, the finished product is pretty superficial. Will that get a passing mark? Potentially. Will it get a great one? Nope."

Mr. Huh - Your writing reflects your thinking. To understand the text is to read the text. That is the only tool that allows you to say something intelligent about the topic. Simply the lack of willingness to read the material becomes evident when virtually nothing is being said with your writing.

Ms. Sloane - Entering high school, students need to take a new approach to their English classes. That's what really makes a high school English class; "it becomes a literature course [at the highschool level], it's [no longer] a language course like in elementary. Generally, she implores students to take more care in general organization of ideas. At the grade 9 level, focus on structure and basic writing skill. "With Grammarly and AI, I do find that a lot of the content that gets submitted [...] it almost comes off perfect, but then I see in tests that [that skill is not there]." For the senior grades, she urges you to hone in on your abilities to analyze deeply. "It's a difficult thing to teach," she admits, "because there's not a specific way of doing it." While making a connection to the context is good, she recommends that to "really take it to the next level", you should focus more on the analysis of diction, of specific words. Try not to lose the argument while you're analyzing; be sure that everything connects back to the thesis so that the point of the essay is not lost.

As you can see, there are many aspects of English that are applicable outside of the English classroom. The communication skills we learn in English class, for example, are essential to our everyday lives. In this day and age, we are always finding new and improved ways to communicate, especially through the internet and social media. It's no secret that we also use these tools to connect to people around us.

At the end of the day, communication is a fundamental skill that everyone needs in their daily lives in order to connect with the world around them. These skills are fostered by foundations of grammar and sentence structure and writing technique, but they are amplified by the research and analysis skills that give depth to not only our writing but our everyday lives.

To dismiss English class as a course that won't be useful in your future is not only untrue but it creates a limiting future in which people's lives are lacking in enrichment because the inability to think critically and analyze information and have an intelligent argument makes the world around them two-dimensional. Books, movies, even albums will become valueless pieces of media to be consumed without further thought because we have conditioned ourselves to believe that to listen is the same as to know, and in doing so we rob ourselves from experiencing the fullness of life. It is the fundamental human experience to want to be known by those around us, which is why people write songs and make movies and tell stories; it is what makes the classics you read in your English classes classic because people have had their experiences, their emotions, their ideals seen and known through those stories.



As much as these words may sound like the ramblings of just another future English teacher, do not mistake them for baseless, dramatic, over-exaggerations. To lose that ability to connect and communicate with the world around us by deriving ourselves of these fundamental skills is to deprive ourselves of a richer life of knowing and being known. If you've read this far, I can only hope that the words of your teachers and my words alike have meant something to you and have let us all come to know each other.






The Kite Runner - Khaled Hosseini

The Alchemist - Paulo Coelho




When Breath Becomes Air - Paul Kalanithi






Rip It Up - Richard Wiseman



PEDESTRIAN SAFETY: STAYING SAFE ON 16TH!

Did you know that in 2021 alone, around seven thousand pedestrians were killed due to traffic collisions worldwide? And that in order to just cross the road, people need about 26 different judgement skills just to be safe? Things, like predicting how fast a vehicle is moving or finding the right moment to cross a road, are needed just to get to the other side of the road. However, we aren't all physicists, we're just teens! That's why pedestrian safety should not be taken lightly but treated with the utmost regard!

Road-users, like pedestrians and cyclists, are especially vulnerable to collisions on the road. This is because these users do not have a protective shell of a vehicle or other safety equipment to protect themselves in case of a collision. This is why around 32% of all collision fatalities in 2021 were people from this vulnerable group. Furthermore, the conditions here in Canada do not help with this dilemma either. Every year, we Canadians have to deal with rain, snow, hail, and fog just to get to where we need to be! These conditions often make it a hassle for pedestrians as it puts a greater risk on their safety, especially regarding their visibility as well as their navigation (through traffic congestion). The youth are among the most vulnerable and this is due to a variety of different reasons; however, the most significant one is distracted walking. One reason why teen pedestrians are always involved in accidents is the fact that they are constantly using cell phones and other mobile devices! Using these devices while crossing the street or walking makes us miss important warnings or cues, increasing the likelihood of us getting struck. In fact, when asked what they were doing at the time of their crash, 47% of teens said that they were listening to music and a good 38% admitted that they were either talking on the phone or texting.
